
**Wairarapa Orienteering Club
from Mapsport #13, Winter 1990**

(Edits by Bryan Teahan in italics)

That was Then - Bill Teahan

Back in the early days of 1982, three brothers got together and decided to start a new club. (In truth, it was the older brother, Graham, who persuaded the other two, Bryan and Bill, to help start the club, and left them to do all the work). Since that day, although the Wairarapa Orienteering Club is one of the smallest orienteering clubs in New Zealand, the club has organized many major events and its past and present members have enjoyed a degree of national and international success.

(A promotional event was held early in 1982 on Mount Holdsworth Rd in an area now called Rivenrock Mountain Bike Park to gauge interest in creating a club).



Promotional Event

The inaugural event was held at Matahiwi (March 1982) and consisted of a black and white map with 30 metre contours, which believe it or not was surprisingly detailed and easy to read. This area has now been included in a new map which will be used for the Wellington Champs this year. That first event attracted about 20 people, but a few turned out to be stalwarts of the club over the next few years.


Wayne Cretney was one of the first to go out on a course and was immediately hooked. He ended up doing all 3 courses that day. A few months later at a club meeting he suggested that he'd like to 'do a map'. Understandably, we were a bit dubious. However, he was enthusiastic, and we left him to it. Within another few months without any help, he had:

1. Obtained a basemap with 20m contours and did all the fieldwork including drawing

intermediate contours down to 10m.

2. Drawn the map, and then printed it in 5 colours on his own offset printer. *(This was before laser printing)*
3. Set and vetted the courses.

And he organized the publicity for the event as well!



First Event – March 1982

Sadly, Wayne died in a tragic accident in 1988, but during the short 7 years he was a member of the club, he spent countless hours organizing events and making maps, and was the cornerstone on which the club was built. He is missed by all who knew him.

Some of the others who turned up at that first event and became club stalwarts were Ron Brown, Margaret McLachlan (with her sister Shirley), and Brent and Raymond Ferris. Brent Ferris was the equipment officer for the first few years, and Ron Brown was the driving force behind the club holding the Tararua Mountain Marathon. Margaret McLachlan was roped into becoming the secretary and is now married to *(Patrick)* one of the brothers of the three who started the club (there are 8 sons and 3 daughters, 2 sons-in-law and 6 daughters-in law (so far) in the family).

(The last 3 also got married – Pauline (also a club member) in 1991, Bill in 2001, and Bryan in 2002)

Some interesting facts:

- Over the years there has been a large turnover in club members. At the end of the first year there were 45 paid up club members.

- In the first 5 years of the club, senior subs rose from \$5 to \$13, and the event fees from \$1 to \$3.

- Over the years the club has organized several major events and numerous OYs. The club has held one multi-day on its own (at Whareama and Te Wharau) and been involved in another (when the Birthday Hill map was first used). It has organized the Wellington Champs once (at Omega), and the Wellington Relays once as well (at Hidden Lakes). The club also organized the Tararua Mountain Marathon and 2 mini mountain marathons.

- Club meetings for the first 4 years were held above a wholesale liquor outlet - but the general manager (another brother - *Bernard*) wouldn't allow us a drink! One meeting was held in 70 degrees Fahrenheit and one annual general meeting was over in 30 minutes.

The club newsletters have made interesting reading over the years. Some of the amusing stories were:

- A certain guy (Ron) who marked the course on his plastic bag with his map inside and then later on wondered why his map kept moving.

- The same guy who being a trumper was used to correcting for magnetic north and wondered why his compass didn't seem to work properly.

- Wayne Cretney claiming "dog time". He reckoned his dog got lost on the course and wasted 14 minutes trying to find it. Dog time indeed! The dog in question was seen to run into the finish some time ahead of its owner!

- The setter (Wayne) who managed to get most of the runners electrocuted by making them believe all the fences were off.

- Wayne again, trying to tell everyone that gorse bushes had grown overnight on his new map.

- The setter (Bryan) who put two controls where even his own brother couldn't find them, so consequently they were left out of the course.

- The escapades of the mapper (Bill) who borrowed his brother's motorbike to get out to Ngaumu only to have it break down a long way from home. He gets a lift and then pays the earth to get it fixed only to have it break down again the very next time he takes it out. He decides against using the !\$\$?%! machine a third time so he tries to bike out (40K) but has a puncture a long way out. He walks home a dejected would-be mapper who has missed 4 days of mapping. He finally commandeers his father's car to get out there.

- The continuing escapades of the mapper who also tried to catch a bus to get out there but missed it. Later (with his brother Bryan this time) he got stranded out on a

farmer's track on the same map when his new car (bought 2 days before) gave up the ghost and wouldn't start. At 7.00 PM in a howling southerly, this was no joke. Needless to say, he is still out there... No in fact, the car was hotwired and our miserable mapper got home finally.

Some interesting quotes from club magazines :

"Cripes, Ron, did you know that the contours were 20 meters and not 5 meters before you set the courses?"

"With control descriptions in hand, surrounded by 30 or 40 psyched up, evil looking competitors awaiting the start signal, when shouts of 'Let's take him now, there's more of us than him.' - terror!"

"Fifteen to 20 competitors sighted on the knoll well before control 41 - "Fan out! Fan out! It's around here somewhere!"

"Normally you can trust an orienteer to read a map, but he managed to get himself lost at a major road junction. Usually, you can expect a sign but there wasn't one in sight. It took a non-orienteer to figure it out - we were on "Boot" Road because there was a boot stuck upside down on a pole right in front of us."

"After placing the controls out and heading back to the car, I met with Margaret again. I yelled to her across the river - 'This bit of the river isn't too bad for crossing, is it?'

'No. I don't think so.'

'Oh good, I'll put the control over there then.'

When I got up talking with her, I said that I'd hidden some of the controls in good spots. With that look of worry and 'Oh what has he done' appeared on her face, which I tried to relieve saying that they 'should' be able to find them."

"The outing at the "Governor's" was very nice and the whole room was full of orienteers. I think the boys and girls were more interested in space invaders than their meals. Mr. Syke's magic was very good, and I bet the lady won't ever put her finger in ever again."

"The pong at the start was too much for me so I decided to get away on the A course as quickly as possible. The first thought I had was that the first control looks tricky. I charge off and then wade through thigh-deep water taking care not to get the map wet."

"Bout time Brown set a course" murmured the meeting - He He, revenge is sweet - on a map the Teahan mob had spent some time doing. Wayne Cretney, dropping in one night later in the week on the pretext of returning the signs, spied the A & B courses on said map and glee-fully set about re-organizing some of the controls - so for those controls you missed, Wayne's to blame! And for those that got them all - well you got'a get lucky sometimes."

This Is Now - Liz Nicholson (1990)

This year there are currently 13 club members which could increase to a maximum of 20. The youngest current member is Kristian Anderson (14), and the oldest is Albert Wardle (60) both of whom joined this year.

Members occupations range from student, retired, security guard, teacher, bank manager, quantity surveyor, secretary, computer whiz, architect, director WORT, system administrator, home executive...

The club's equipment is minimal with originally only 25 controls made of heavy steel. These were upgraded to 50 by Masterton's Mayor (and rugby referee), who made lightweight stainless steel standards which are terrific. (Red Kiwis and Hutt also have some made by him).


Winter Classic:

In 1987, the club introduced a "Winter Classic" event with the idea being to have 3 technical and physically difficult courses of varying lengths. In 1987 it was a series with Hawkes Bay and Red Kiwis.


In 1988 the club had hoped to use its new Walls Whare map but alas heavy rain on the Saturday brought down large slips blocking the only road access to the event (we didn't get to use the map until 12 months after the printing). The club being very hospitable invited all those that travelled over the hill (for some beautiful Wairarapa weather) to Cretney's for mulled wine etc.

In 1989 we held the Winter Classic at Birthday Hill (the course setter, Tony Nixon, was in Europe, just like Bryan when he set the WOA Relays at Hidden Lakes that year). The club gave out certificates and badges to all competitors.


In 1990, the club is holding the "Winter Classic" on July 15. This is a special occasion as this will be the first of the annual Wayne Cretney Memorial events. Mavis Cretney is donating a special trophy for the M40A grade. There will be certificates/badges and it will be run as a Blodslitet type race. The course design has been done by Ingvaar Braaten (Norway) who helped fieldwork Scotts Ferry, and accompanied myself and Wayne in the Ruahine MM. This event is to be pre-entry, with entry forms available at Queen's Birthday.



1985 New Zealand 2 day Mountain Marathon




1990 New Zealand Trial








Rainbow at Winter Classic 2013

APOC 1994 Day 3, 1995 Wellington Champs – Glenroy






Location of Maps







Wairarapa Orienteers stalwart Jim Barr describes his club as having been “in recess” for nearly a decade. During this time club members have continued to compete at various events around the country, but the club has not hosted events.

On 6th December last year something changed. The return of former member Bryan Teahan, and with him, the Winter Classic Event. The Winter Classic was created as a memorial event to a Wairarapa member, so it was fitting that the first event run by the club for years was the Classic. Despite being a small event with 37 participants, three-quarters of those taking part were not members – signalling a renewed interest in orienteeing events in the region.

On 18th February, The Times-Age, Masterton and Wairarapa’s local weekly, signalled that there was more to come (<https://times-age.co.nz/kickstarting-orienteeing/>)

– reporting that Wairarapa Orienteers would be holding a series of free town score/urban rogaine events being held in Masterton. The series will be followed by two further events being held at Queen Elizabeth Park and Henley Lake areas using the club’s new map. The final event will take place on 30th March. To take part in the free events members of the public just need a smart phone and to have downloaded the MapRun6 application.

The new map and free events have been accompanied with a new Facebook page as well as information sheets positioned around Masterton walkway entrances and sent out to all local schools. All these initiatives combined with the intended new website are what Jim describes as decision to “kick-start the club and get it going again”.

How Maps Were Made

One of the club's most loved maps (Hapua Wetlands) was made almost from nothing in 2007 – it was used first for the Winter Classic and has since been reused for a JWOC trial, the New Zealand relay champs and the 2013 Winter Classic.


Nowadays, we have access to high resolution imagery and Digital Elevation Models so that very detailed base maps and accurate contours can be generated for fieldworking. None of that was available in the early (dark) days and required lots of work. Here's a brief illustration of what was involved.

For the Hapua map, I've included different versions to show how the map-making process worked during the creation of a map:

Version 1 was just the scanned topographical map with 20m contours at mapping scale.

Version 2 was the aerial photo with the drawn 20m contours on top.

Version 3 was the aerial photo with the interpolated 5m contours. I printed this version and used this to do the fieldwork off.

Version 7 was the one created after the fieldwork was done. You can spot areas where there are too many or not enough contours and some contour ends. There were lots of rubbing out to get the correct shapes.

Version 9 is after all the fieldwork is done in the surrounding areas and any contour problems have been fixed.

Version 20 is the final version used for the event (Winter Classic) after some fieldchecking before and after putting out the controls.

An Ode to an Orienteer - Bryan Teahan (1988)

By now most of you would have heard about the tragic death of Wayne Cretney - a member of the Wairarapa club. I have known him since the beginning of the club 7 years ago - it seems like I knew him for much longer. I feel it appropriate to write a few memories about this very special man.

Wayne will be sorely missed in many ways as he was the mainstay of our club, and I will remember him forever for the incredible amount of work he put into Orienteering.

For the 7 years he was a member he has indelibly left his mark forever in the lifeblood of our club. He was the rock on which the foundations of the club were laid.

I remember him for:

- the very first day I met him - the very first event of the club - he ran all 3 courses and came back with that gleam in his eye knowing he was hooked - 'this is the sport for me'.

- walking around hills and valleys in rain or shine carrying hundreds of controls. For the countless, thankless tasks he did.


- for the advice and guidance of an experienced person for a club in its infancy; for being club president for 2 years and a steadying influence to shape our club's future.

- for the titanic battles he had with the members of the M40 brigade; the grade will not seem as competitive now that he's gone.

- he was the perfect member of a club - always giving; always working hard in all aspects of the sport far beyond and above the normal - even sometimes to the detriment of work commitment and family life.

- for his large smile as he thundered around on his courses with map and compass clad only in his running pants and his thick bear rug of a chest.

- in the first few months of his Orienteering career he did the incredible: he mapped, drew, offset printed and set a course - a monumental feat for a new person to Orienteering - only a person of Wayne's enthusiasm, drive and determination could have achieved this.



Fieldwork, Cartography, Printing and Planning all by Wayne - a Cretney Colour Special Map 1983


- for the special moments of family togetherness - the very real love between Wayne and his family - the trials and tribulations of a family Orienteering together.

- for the courses he set - he never was the running sort of Orienteer; he loved a meaty sort of course in the most difficult part of the map - in the light green and grubby stuff, in the intricate parts of the forest and in the steep physical parts of a map. You certainly knew that when you finished a Wayne Cretney course you had passed the most exacting test possible, and you could henceforth take on any challenge.


His courses were rugged, but they were some of the best courses I have competed on and my skill as an Orienteer will be poorer for not having him to keep me up to scratch.


