Grateful to be out jogging again after a long discussion with my Achilles and a steroid injection or two






118 to 116:

- Walkway and Street: 422m




101 to 106:

- W side of lagoon & small bridge: 261m


- E side of lagoon: 325m



108 to 104:


- Small bridge + W side of lagoon: 267m

W side of lagoon: 302mE side of lagoon: 406m




107 to 112:

- Via small walking track: 635m


- Via path next to river: 653m
